Dear Smithtown School Community,

We hope this message finds you well and that you and your children have had a successful start to this school year! As the year begins in earnest, we felt this would be a good opportunity to send a reminder about the collective responsibility we all share in creating and maintaining a safe, supportive school environment for all of our students. To that end, the district has developed a robust set of supports and educational opportunities for our students.

Over the last few years, the district has increased the number of support staff who are available to assist our students and their families. In addition to increased staffing, we have instituted a building-wide referral system in order to identify and assist any student that may need an additional layer of support due to academic and/or behavioral concerns. In addition, SCSD has partnered with Northwell Health to further our coordination of care and support for students in crisis and their families in our school community. The district has also partnered with the Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD) to bring educational programs to our students. This year, the SCPD will be working with our 4th, 6th, and 7th grade students to teach them about internet safety and the dangers of cyberbullying. They will also lead sessions about internet safety and the dangers of sexting with our high school students in their Health classes. The district also provides information on topics such as internet safety, conflict resolution and bullying within the Health curriculum at the elementary and middle schools. This year, the district will also work with the Long Island Coalition Against Bullying, (LICAB) to support our middle schools in promoting bully-free school communities.

We have a moral and legal obligation to provide this safe, supportive environment. It is codified in state law with the Dignity for All Students Act and via Board of Education Policies #0115 [Student Harassment, Discrimination and Bullying Prevention and Intervention](#) and #5300 [Code of Conduct](#). It is not uncommon for students to have disagreements and peer conflicts, but when these situations rise to the level of harassment, discrimination and/or bullying there will be consequences. Please know that the district stands ready to live up to this obligation. To report an incident of harassment, discrimination or bullying, contact your building level Dignity Act Coordinator. School security and the safety of our students and staff has always been of utmost importance to the Board of Education and administration. We have resources, clear plans, and detailed procedures in place to address prevention, as well as emergency situations. As we have shared in the past, the district routinely partners with the Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD) in an effort to stay current and obtain their feedback and support. This support is greatly appreciated and always sought when we deal with a situation that may constitute a threat to our schools, students and staff. Please know that all threats to our schools and students are taken seriously and investigated immediately. Should the SCPD determine that a threat was made, an arrest will be made regardless of the intention of the person who made the threat. **A new state law (N.Y. Penal Law § 240.78) has broadened the definition of what constitutes a threat that can be punished criminally.** The new law makes it illegal to make a mass threat of harm with the "intent to intimidate a group of people or to create public alarm." To be found guilty of making a mass threat, the offender would not need to be shown to have the intent or capability of committing the conduct they are threatening, according to the recently signed law. The School District would also implement school based consequences in accordance with the School District's Code of Conduct, Board of Education Policy #5300.

We ask for your support and assistance with these important issues. With today's technology, a poor choice can have long ranging, serious consequences and we hope that you will speak with your children and reinforce the importance of positive decision making. By working together, we can help create the environment we all want for our children to thrive, and our hope for a bright future will be better realized.


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
